
The Display of Happiness vs. Disgust: A comparison of emotion display rules between Australia and the USA

Analysis of different expressive modes (Matsumoto et al.)

Mean Scores for each Expressive Mode in Australia and the USA are very similar, but suggests USA to amplify more and Australians to deamplify more

	Express	Deamplify	Amplify	Qualify	Mask
Australia	0.12	0.27	0.01	0.03	0.05
USA	0.12	0.25	0.03	0.04	0.04

The Present Study

- To observe the relative size of similarities and differences in display rules in Australian vs. the USA
- To explore Australia US difference in display rules by taking account of gender, target, and other variables.

Summary of samples

- N=398
 276 women, 122 men
- Age M=24.3, SD=6.2
- Ethnic composition

Australia

- N=142
 117 women, 25 men
- Age M=22.7, SD=7.9
- Ethnic composition

Mixture	19%
Other	39%

- Native born 94%
- English 1st language 99%
- N used in analyses =75
 61 women, 14 men

Design and DV

Between-subject factors

- Country (Australia vs. USA)
- Gender (male vs. female)

Within-subject factors


- Emotion (Disgust vs. Happiness)
- Target (intimate friend vs. acquaintance vs. 50-year old professor)
- Target gender (male vs. female)
- Context (private vs. public)

Dependent measure: The degree to which each emotion should be expressed –

- 1 'show nothing'
- 2 'show less than you feel it'
- 3 'express it as you feel it'
- 4 'show more than you feel it'

Results


Overall, effects involving Country are few in numbers and small in size. Out of 12 significant (p < .01) effects only two involved Country.



Country x Emotion


F(1, 259)=7.93, p = .005, partial eta² = .03

Country x Emotion x Target


F(2,518)=4.52, p = .01, partial eta² = .02

Conclusion

- Australia-USA difference is subtle.
- Australian display rules allow less expression of disgust than American's, especially toward friends and acquaintances
